

Manohar, Uzendu to Participate in Health Equity Scholars Program





Poorni Manohar, M.D., an Assistant Professor in the Division of Hematology and Oncology, and **Anezi Uzendu, M.D.,** an Assistant Professor in the Division of Cardiology, have been selected to participate in the two-year UT Southwestern and Parkland Health Equity Scholars Program.

Dr. Manohar's project: "To Build a Multipronged Approach to Increase Mammography Screening and Education to Address Health Disparities in Breast Cancer in the Community Working with the Simmons Comprehensive Cancer Center."

Dr. Manohar earned her medical degree at the Wright State University Boonshoft School of Medicine. After completing a residency in internal medicine at the University of Michigan Hospital, she gained advanced training in hematology and oncology through a fellowship at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Center at the University of Washington, where she served as Chief Fellow.

Dr. Manohar joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2023.

Dr. Uzendu's project: "Work with Local School District to Mitigate the Disparities in Sudden Cardiac Death Through Sustainable Education and Partnerships."

Dr. Uzendu earned his medical degree at the University of Missouri Kansas City School of Medicine. He completed internal medicine residency training at the University of Alabama at Birmingham Hospital and received advanced training through fellowships in cardiovascular medicine at Ohio State University Medical Center and in interventional cardiology at Massachusetts General Hospital's Corrigan Minehan Heart Center. He also completed a research fellowship in cardiovascular outcomes at Saint Luke's Mid America Heart Institute.

Dr. Uzendu joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2023.

CANCER PREVENTION AND RESEARCH INSTITUTE OF TEXAS

Courtney Awarded CPRIT Grant to Support Kidney Cancer Research



Kevin Courtney, M.D., Ph.D., an Associate Professor in the Division of Hematology and Oncology, has received a CPRIT Clinical Investigator Award for \$913,682 to support his research into "Identifying and Exploiting Novel Metabolic Vulnerabilities in the Treatment of Kidney Cancer." Clinical Investigator Awards support mid-career clinician scientists in their efforts to devote more time to clinical cancer research.

In total, the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) approved \$60.6 million in grants to advance the state's cancer-related academic research projects. Overall,

researchers at UT Southwestern received \$11.5 million in funding.

A native of New Hampshire, Dr. Courtney earned his medical degree and a doctorate in molecular cancer biology at Duke University in North Carolina. He completed internal medicine residency training at the University of California-San Francisco, and then received advanced training through a clinical fellowship in medical oncology at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute/Dana-Farber Harvard Cancer Center and a postdoctoral research fellowship at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, both in Boston. He also holds a master's degree in clinical sciences from UT Southwestern.

Dr. Courtney joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2012. His clinical and translational research efforts focus on prostate and kidney cancer, as well as other genitourinary cancers.

Course on Refugee Health Now Available to Medical Students

Eight medical students have been working with **Sawsan Rashdan, M.D.**, an Assistant Professor in the Division of Hematology and Oncology, to develop an inaugural course in the medical school focused on health disparities among refugee populations.

"The course features a fantastic lineup of speakers and interactive sessions," Dr. Rashdan says. "It's a great, innovative course, and the students have put in a tremendous amount of effort to make it happen."

Refugees face numerous obstacles throughout their journey, including significant challenges in accessing health care. Factors such as limited insurance coverage, financial difficulties, and language barriers contribute to the health disparities seen in refugee populations. It is essential for future health professionals to understand these experiences and the existing health inequities within refugee communities to provide culturally sensitive and appropriate care.

The program aims to enhance knowledge and awareness among medical and health professional students about refugees, their health, and the barriers they face in accessing care; equip students with strategies to improve cultural competence when working with patients from refugee backgrounds; and increase the involvement of medical students in refugee health initiatives.

The course begins on Sept. 10. Students can register through PeopleSoft under "Manage Classes."

Heyward Discusses Value of Community, Importance of Inclusion, in Academia



Frankie Heyward, Ph.D., an Assistant Professor in the Center for Hypothalamic Research, was recently featured in a *Nature* Q&A series celebrating "people who fight racism in science and who champion inclusion."

In 2021, Dr. Heyward founded the nonprofit National Black Postdoctoral Association (NBPA), to create community and offset isolation among Black academics. The organization now includes more than 700 members.

"When socializing and collaborating, my colleagues could tap into their groups of peers with similar identities and

experiences, but I had to do without," Dr. Heyward says. "Realizing that this isolation was hindering my well-being and limiting my career opportunities gave me the idea for the NBPA."

Thinwa to Speak on Activating Autophagy to Fight Viruses on Aug. 29



Josephine Thinwa, M.D., Ph.D., an Assistant Professor in the Division of Infectious Diseases and Geographic Medicine, will deliver the Infectious Diseases and Geographic Medicine Grand Rounds lecture on Thursday, Aug. 29, at 8 a.m. in Y7.316. Her topic: "Turning on Autophagy to Fight Viruses."

Dr. Thinwa's research focuses on autophagy, a natural cell-recycling process that helps cells break down and eliminate viruses and other unnecessary components. Her laboratory investigates how autophagy becomes activated by viruses that cause infections of the central nervous system. Her goal is to increase understanding on the role of autophagy in the

immune response to viruses and, ultimately, to use this knowledge to develop new vaccines and treatments for an array of viruses.

Dr. Thinwa joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2021.
