### **UTSW Structural Heart Team Achieves Milestone**



The **UTSW** structural heart team recently achieved a milestone by performing the first trans-catheter tricuspid valve repair using the TriClip G4 Delivery System.

"Clements University Hospital is one of the first in North Texas to perform the TriClip tricuspid valve repair," says **Anthony Bavry, M.D.**, a Professor in the Division of Cardiology and Director of the Structural Heart Program. "This innovative technology broadens our range of minimally invasive treatments armamentarium for valvular heart disease."

The minimally invasive procedure uses a clip, inserted through a catheter, which grasps the valve's leaflets to reduce blood backflow. It improves quality of life for those with persistent tricuspid regurgitation (TR) who aren't candidates for open-heart surgery. Patients usually spend one day in the hospital and can resume normal activities within three to four months.

about the hazards of hospitalization of the elderly and the importance of preventing and recognizing delirium.

**VanWagner Presents Starzl Lecture at Liver Meeting** 



**Lisa VanWagner, M.D.**, an Associate Professor in the Division of Digestive and Liver Diseases, delivered the Thomas E. Starzl Transplant Surgery State-of-the-Art Lecture at the American Association for the Study of Liver Diseases (AASLD) Liver Meeting. Her topic: "Life after a Liver: Victories, Challenges, and Opportunities for More."

Named after Thomas Starzl, M.D., the surgeon who performed the world's first human liver transplant in 1963, the annual lecture recognizes Dr. Starzl's pioneering work to elevate liver transplantation from an experimental procedure to one that saves thousands of lives annually.

"It was an honor for Dr. VanWagner to be selected, as this lecture is generally given by a surgeon," says **Jorge Bezerra, M.D.**, Professor and Chair of Pediatrics. "Lisa's highly effective presentation was outstanding."

Dr. VanWagner joined the UT Southwestern Faculty in 2022.



# Tan to Lecture About Adult Congenital Heart Disease on Dec. 6



Weiyi Tan, M.D., M.P.H., an Assistant Professor in the Division of Cardiology, will present the <u>Internal Medicine Grand Rounds</u> lecture on **Friday, Dec. 6, at 8 a.m. in D1.502**. His topic: "ACHD in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Changing Demographics of the Adult Congenital Heart Disease Population and Evolution of the Field."

Dr. Tan earned his medical degree at Duke University School of Medicine. He completed a residency in internal medicine and pediatrics at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), where he also received advanced training through fellowships in adult cardiovascular disease, adult congenital

heart disease, and adult interventional cardiology. He also holds a master's degree in public health from the Gillings School of Global Public Health at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Dr. Tan joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2021.

## Maya-Ramos to Discuss Endotrophin in Heart Failure on Dec. 6



Lisandro Maya-Ramos, M.D., Ph.D., a PSTP Fellow in the Division of Cardiology, will present the <a href="Internal Medicine">Internal Medicine</a> <a href="Research Conference">Research Conference</a> on Friday, Dec. 6, at noon in E6.200. His topic: "Small Peptide, Large Implications: Endotrophin in HFpEF."

Dr. Maya-Ramos holds a bachelor's degree in human biology from the University of California San Diego. He earned his medical degree and his doctorate from the University of California San Francisco. He then received internal medicine residency training at UT Southwestern.

Under the mentorship of **Joseph Hill, M.D., Ph.D.**, Professor in the Division of Cardiology and Director of the Moss Heart Center, and **Philipp Scherer, Ph.D.**, Professor and Director of the Touchstone Diabetes Center, he is investigating the role of adipose tissue extracellular matrix derived peptides in inflammatory diseases, including heart failure with preserved ejection fraction.

In 2023, Dr. Maya-Ramos was one of only 25 scientists nationwide selected for the prestigious Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI) Hanna H. Gray Fellowship, a program that provides funding through fellowship and into the first years of a faculty position.

Dr. Hill holds the Frank M. Ryburn Jr. Chair in Heart Research and the James T. Willerson, M.D., Distinguished Chair in Cardiovascular Diseases.

Dr. Scherer holds the Gifford O. Touchstone, Jr. and Randolph G. Touchstone Distinguished Chair in Diabetes Research and the Touchstone/West Distinguished Chair in Diabetes Research.
