

2022 StandPoint Survey Results

Many of you recently completed the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) StandPoint Faculty Engagement Survey. Thank you for your input, your candor, and your contribution to our 70% response rate, which exceeded the 59% response rate of the overall AAMC cohort.

Compared to the last StandPoint Survey conducted in 2019, the overall satisfaction with mentoring and supervisor feedback has increased, as these qualities are paramount to the development of careers in academic medicine. The understanding of promotion and tenure requirements also improved significantly. These results reflect the enhancement in relationships between faculty and their supervisors.

This progress has been supported by various initiatives in response to the last StandPoint survey, including the development of the new <u>Clinician Track</u>, more focused <u>Promotion and Tenure</u> <u>Workshops</u>, and the <u>Starting University Clinical Careers Effectively, Scholarly, and Successfully</u> (SUCCESS) program for new clinician-educators.

For global satisfaction, when faculty members were asked if they are satisfied with the medical school as a place to work, **76%** of respondents answered very satisfied or satisfied and **18%** are neutral. The satisfied group at 76% has the same proportion as it was on our last survey 3 years ago, and 2% higher than AAMC cohort institutions. Of note, the proportion of basic science faculty who would recommend UT Southwestern as a place to work was particularly high at **83%**.

Survey results made it clear that we need to challenge ourselves to accelerate the pace in which decisions are made and be proactive in sharing financial information. We must foster an environment in which everyone feels seen and heard and work to align overall compensation with changes in the economy and health care industry.

Your responses will inform the priorities and strategic plans of institutional leadership, department chairs, and center directors. We are committed to tracking our progress and keeping ourselves accountable as we work toward making UT Southwestern Medical Center a place where all faculty can thrive.

Starting this month, Scholars will have two years of protected time (20% FTE) to engage in a mentored health equity or community outreach project. At the end of the two-year period, they will continue working with underserved and disadvantaged populations with support from their department and/or grants.

Jointly funded by UT Southwestern and Parkland, the program seeks to equip faculty in the Clinician-Educator or Clinician Tracks with practical tools to engage the community in activities that promote health and support health equity.


