### **Putting the Pieces Together: Your Path to Promotion and Tenure**

The 2025 Promotion and Tenure (P&T) season is currently underway. The Medical School Faculty P&T Committee – chaired by Lance Terada, M.D., and co-chaired by Russell DeBose-Boyd, Ph.D., and Myra Wyckoff, M.D. – is planning to review 204 declared candidates this year: 33 in the Clinician Track, 122 in the Clinician-Educator Track, 16 in the Clinical Scholar Track, five in the Research Track, and 28 in the Tenure Track.

To prepare faculty members for future promotion, Faculty Development will start the year hosting the Demystifying the P&T Process Symposium followed by track-specific workshops through April 2025.

Dr. He recognized with AHA Distinguished Scientist Award

<u>Jiang He, M.D., Ph.D.</u>, Professor and Chair Designate of Epidemiology in the Peter O'Donnell Jr. School of Public Health, received the American Heart Association's highest commendation, the Distinguished Scientist award.

The honor recognizes Dr. He's prolific research on reducing the risks of cardiometabolic diseases, including heart disease, stroke, obesity, Type 2 diabetes, hypertension, dyslipidemia, and chronic kidney disease.

Dr. He's research on the global burdens of hypertension, the effect of passive smoking on myocardial infarction, and the role of dietary sodium intake in cardiovascular disease helped develop national and international public health policies. Read more.

Dr. Hobbs, Professor in the Eugene McDermott Center for Human Growth and Development and one of our most acclaimed faculty, received the Distinguished Biomedical Science Educator Award "for her teaching excellence and the inspiration she has provided to first-year medical students over the course of her career."



Dr. Pearson, Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology, beloved for her work with students and residents, earned the Distinguished Clinical Science Educator Award "for her talent, passion for teaching, and her absolute dedication to excellence in the education of our medical students."

#### In Memoriam

### **Dr. Sharon Reimold (1958-2024)**

Sharon Reimold, M.D., Professor of Internal Medicine, passed away Nov. 13.

Dr. Reimold joined the UT Southwestern faculty in 2000. She served as Clinical Chief of Cardiology for 10 years before becoming Vice Chair of Clinical Operations and Faculty Development of the Department of Internal Medicine in 2016. Under her leadership, outpatient operations expanded significantly.

As a cardiologist and expert in in noninvasive imaging, Dr. Reimold studied gender differences in the presentation of heart disease, with an emphasis on treating and diagnosing cardiac disease in women.

Dr. Reimold championed the recruitment, mentorship, and development of female faculty throughout her career – serving on the Women in Science and Medicine Advisory Committee (WISMAC) and chairing the UT Southwestern Annual Compensation Equity Study.

Her legacy will inspire faculty colleagues, learners, and all with whom she worked, for many years to come.
